Lesson Plan and Activities: Key Stage 1

Topic: What can the church building tell us about Jesus and what Christians believe?

Connection to Warwickshire SACRE RE syllabus

SIAMS defines the purpose of RE to be religious literacy which is defined on their website as helping children and young people hold balanced and well-informed conversations about religion and belief.

One aspect of this is theology which is about believing. It looks at where beliefs come from, how they have changed over time, how they are applied differently in different contexts and how they relate to each other.

Another aspect are human and social sciences which explore the diverse ways in which people practise their beliefs, engaging with the impact of beliefs on individuals, communities and societies.

To the teacher: Visiting All Saints Church, Ladbroke will give your pupils an opportunity to explore an ancient church building where Christians worship week by week.

Lesson 3: Post visit: Belonging to a group

General note to church hosting visits

Church members (and the vicar if available) will have the general knowledge about the subject and specific knowledge about this church and therefore is the best person to lead activities during the visit. If you want a child to read something out loud ask the teacher to select them.

Do **not** give all the answers! the children will benefit most by discovering for themselves and in conversation and discussion

The teacher will know their pupils and be able to rephrase and encourage non-responders.

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Lesson 1: Preparation to visit: Who was Jesus?

Suggested activities

- 1.Group activity: Watch this clip from BBC bitesize: https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/clips/zfpvcdm (Who was Jesus and where did he grow up?)
- 2. Group activity: Thumbs up, thumbs down

Ask the children to put their thumbs up or down to show whether they think the following statements are true.

- Jesus was born in Leamington Spa.
- Jesus lived a long time ago.
- Jesus's Mum was called Rebecca.
- Jesus grew up in a posh family with lots of money
- When Jesus grew up, he had some followers called disciples
- Christians believe Jesus did some amazing miracles where poorly people suddenly got better
- Jesus worked in a chip shop
- Jesus was killed in a horrible way
- Christians believe Jesus rose from the dead and is still alive today
- 3. Individual activity: Illustrated timeline /Cartoon strip of Jesus' life (including resurrection) children have cut up version to stick on to page in correct order Resource sheet 1a
- 4. Using Resource sheet 1b ask children to complete the sentences differentiated options offered.

Lesson 2: In the church:

A What are the different parts of the church building for?

Activity

- 1.Ask children to go round the church and find the items or places what do they tell you about what happens in the church? (You could intentionally swap round the order for different groups and ask children to find the items in order so as to spread the group round the building.) Use Resource sheet 2
- 2. Gather the children and go through the Resource sheet 2 with a church member explaining and acting out each answer.

Suggested questions:

- Are there any activities that are similar to a place of worship you go to?
- Are there any symbols you recognise (cross, candle perhaps) -what do you think they mean?
- Would a church build in modern times need a pulpit (hint talk about lack of microphones when church was built).
- Did you spot any books with words for the songs or hymns, or prayers?

B What does the church building tell us about Jesus.

Ask the children which symbol reminds Christians about Jesus?

Ask children to spot an empty cross and also a cross that has a man on the front. Explain the crucifix is a statue of Jesus when he was very sadly put to death and the empty cross shows that Christians believe Jesus rose from death. Both are really important in Christianity.

C Response time: (If possible put some quiet worship music on.)

Children could choose to

- Sit quietly and listen to the music and look at a lit candle
- Add a prayer leaf to the prayer tree with a name or drawing of the person they would like the members of the church to pray for.
- Hold a cloth cross (suggest 5 provided by church = sensory crosses for children to hold –
 from material and filled with rice check COVID situation) and ask the children to think or
 pray
- A moving around activity perhaps a large plan of the church with laminated cards with photos of various items for the children to put in the correct place on plan.
- Salt dough ask the children to make the item that they were most interested in.

Resources required at church: Music, lit candle (note on risk assessment), prayer leaves for tree, cloth crosses, salt dough, plan of the church + photos and 5 church members to lead activities or do less of them

Note to church organiser: It would be lovely if the church members could illustrate the welcome of the church by providing drinks and biscuits/fruit from the refreshment point at the end of the visit.

Lesson 3

What does it mean to belong to a group?

Suggested activities

As a group

Discuss how many groups the children belong to (class, Rainbows, Beavers, sports teams and clubs, faith groups)

Discuss how people in groups are similar and different to each other. For example, they may look different but all enjoy football or they may be different ages but all go to the same church or mosque.

Create a Venn diagram with the class being one set and 2 more sets of topics which include most of the children eg children who go to sports groups and children who go to after school club or breakfast club. Ask each child about where they belong and write their name in the appropriate place in the Venn diagram. (This can be done very effectively in a large empty room or outside with a taped or chalked venn diagram on the floor and the children placed in the correct place – although it may need to be done in smaller groups in this case.) Discuss your findings – people can belong to more than one group – what are the similarities and differences between the groups. Point out that when you visit the church, you will be visiting a building where the group of Christians in Ladbroke meet each week.
